A SAINT FOR MAY

St Helena - 21st May



Born about 248 AD, the daughter of an innkeeper, St. Helena married the Roman general Constantius. When he became emperor he divorced her, but her son, later the Emperor Constantine, greatly honoured and respected her. Constantine was the first Christian emperor and under his influence she became a Christian too. Although over sixty at the time of her conversion, she was so devout that her contemporaries imagined she had been a Christian since childhood. She dressed quietly, gave generously to the poor and to churches and used her powerful position to secure the release of prisoners and the return of exiles. Helena is said to have built churches on the sites of the Passion, the Resurrection and the Ascension of Christ. At a very advanced age, Helena made pilgrimages to the Holy Land and to Rome, where she died in 330 AD.

Helena is chiefly famous for having discovered the wood of the cross. In fact all three crosses were found and there was no way of telling which was the one on which Christ had died. At Helena's suggestion, a piece of wood from each cross was brought to the bedside of a sick woman. Two had no effect on her at all but in the presence of wood from the third cross, the woman recovered completely, and it was thus established which was the true cross. Symbols associated with Helena are a cross, three nails and a hammer. Her feast is variously celebrated in May or in August.

Cooking through spring and early summer is a pleasure, particularly if you've gone out and picked a little wild garlic beforehand, and this simple breakfast or lunch dish is no exception. Big flavours and easy to find ingredients make it a pretty, reliable, no-hassle fallback. Late spring is the perfect times to go foraging for this versatile and pungent plant, which can be whipped up into a delicious soup or pesto.

Wild garlic starts appearing in veg boxes, at farmers' markets & on the forest floor, from now until the start of June – not so much a season as a brief window of opportunity.

Wild garlic – AKA ramsons, or ramps, or bear's garlic – is expensive to buy but free to forage, if you know where to look. But you also want to make sure you're picking the right thing: the leaves of wild garlic are easily mistaken for lily of the valley, which is more poisonous than it sounds & also dog's mercury, which is about as poisonous. Neither of these smell or taste like garlic so it should be easy to distinguish, but they tend to grow in the same shady spots. If you're not careful, you may gather up a few stray leaves of the wrong sort.

Wild Garlic, Courgette & Mint soup

Serves 4. as a starter

A deliciously fresh soup, bursting with seasonal flavour that shouts of spring. Cook it quickly to retain the vibrant colour & finish with cheese croutons.

2 tbsp olive oil 1 small onion sliced

6 couraettes sliced

1 garlic clove, crushed

1 bunch wild garlic

1 tbsp fresh mint, chopped

Put two tablespoons of olive oil into a large pan. Add the onion & sauté for a couple of minutes. Before the onion loses any colour, add the courgette & crushed garlic clove. Season & sauté for another minute or two, cover with water & bring to a simmer to soften.

When the vegetables are cooked through (10 minutes maximum), remove the pan from the heat. Add the chopped wild garlic & mint – the residual heat from the soup will cook the wild garlic. If it's too thick, add a little water to thin it out.

Blend, check seasoning, finish with a little olive oil & serve. Cool quickly over iced water if you don't plan to eat it straight away – this keeps the lovely green colour.

Wild garlic, Potato & Chorizo Tortilla. Serves 2

a good handful of wild garlic, rinse the leaves 100g chorizo sausage, a good quality one, sliced 200g potatoes, cooked & cut into cubes 4 large eggs 1 white onion peeled & thinly sliced 2tbs flatleaf parsley, chopped small handful fennel tops, optional 50a butter a dash of olive oil salt & freshly ground black pepper



Heat a heavy-based non-stick frying pan over a medium heat. Add a dash of olive oil & the butter. When the butter is foaming, add the onions & chorizo. Cook while tossing regularly for six to eight minutes or until the onions are soft & the chorizo has given up some of its well-flavoured fat. Add the potatoes & toss them about the pan. Cook for further four or five minutes. Now slice the garlic leaves thinly & scatter into the pan. Turn everything together. Beat the eggs in a bowl & season. Pour the eggs over the chorizo & potatoes; give the pan a little shake. At this point, either gently cook the frittata on the hob, or place in a medium-hot oven until the eggs are just set. It should take only a few minutes to cook through. Scatter with parsley & fennel leaves & serve warm with a simply dressed green salad.

In the Garden with David Oliver

As I write in the middle of April, (I thought I ought to write something for the magazine as I am suffering with a swollen knee which is making life a bit difficult at present) we are enduring a prolonged chilly spell of weather which was a bit of a shock as it followed a couple of very warm days at the end of March. As it was so hot, I decided to remove the insulation & heating from my greenhouses, I wish I hadn't been quite so hasty! The camellias & magnolias have



suffered with frost burn, which is a great shame but that is the joy of gardening – there is usually something to upset your satisfaction! The magnolia is my pride & joy. It was my first Father's Day present; a little twig from Woolworths bought for under a pound over forty years ago, it now stands about 20 feet high. The other evening before the frosts it was bathed in orange light from a beautiful sunset, now it is covered in burnt petals.

My wild area under my fruit trees has been pleasing this year with first the snowdrops & crocuses then a pink corydalis flowered with quite a show of flowers only to vanish a few days later – my camera showed two rabbits nibbling away. At present the area is covered in celandines both the common variety & the *Brazen Hussy* which has the copper-coloured leaves & also several varieties of daffodil. There is also scilla, helleborus *vidris*, moschatel & erythronium out with early purple orchid, camassia & oxeye daisy to flower. I have pricked out some fritillaria seedlings which were sown in 2019 from my own seed & I will also plant them out in the orchard when ready.

I am pleased to have two robins nesting in my garden, one has made a nest on top of some of my flower pots stored under the plant rack & another has nested in a box fixed to a shed & sheltered by a choisya shrub. Surprising as the nest are only about thirty yards apart.

I sowed broad beans earlier this year as I was unable to obtain any autumn sown variety. They have come up with partial success but I have been able to fill the gaps with plants sown in pots by the grand children (as part of their home schooling). Tomatoes were sown in January & have done quite well. I have grown Ailsa Craig, (which although an old established variety still has the best flavour to my mind), & a different variety called San Marzano which is recommended as a tomato to be used in cooking. Radish, spring onion, beetroot, carrots & parsnip have been sowed & they are under cloches at present. Although my early potatoes have been planted I have still to plant my main crop.



May should produce some warmer weather & plants should really start growing. If not already sown, runner & French beans can be sown in pots or directin the soil as well as sweetcorn, courgettes & successional salad crops.



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Almost everyone has heard of autism. But far too few people know what it's actually like to be autistic -both the strengths and how hard life can be at times. The National Autistic Society, understand how autistic people routinely feel misunderstood, and how much they struggle without the right support.

The past year has brought particular challenges for autistic people and their families. Many things need to change to create a society that works for autistic people. We all have a role to play too, by finding out more about what it's like to be autistic and the small things we can all do to make the world a little more autism friendly. Better understanding of autism across society, from schools to workplaces and decision makers in local and national government, would transform hundreds of thousands of lives.

March 29- April 4 marked Autism Awareness Week - with charities seeking to raise awareness of the condition which is estimated to affect 1:100 people in the U.K. The diagnosis spans a wide range of people, from those with an average intelligence, but who struggle in social situations, to people with autism & severe learning difficulties. Many of the latter attend special schools & in adulthood, need residential care or sheltered living.

It can take quite some considerable time to get a diagnosis, with many parents complaining of little signposting to what interventions may help their child. Cash strapped local authorities often contest, in special tribunals, what parents believe their child may need. Parents say that one of the hardest things in negotiating with the statutory authorities is they have to concentrate on informing them what the autistic person can't do. Parental instinct, I have observed, is to celebrate what their autistic children can do, be it brush their own teeth or dress themselves. As parents we celebrate their achievements.

One of the difficulties parents often face is people staring at their autistic child or making derogatory comments like 'can't you control your child.' Many autistic people may flap their hands, make high pitched noises or behave in a manner commensurate with a younger person.

One parent reported she was sitting on the train with her young son repeatedly humming a Thomas the Tank Engine song. The elderly well-dressed lady sitting in the same seating area started to make critical clicks with her tongue. The parent said she was sorry if he disturbed her but he was autistic. 'I don't care whatever he is' she yelled & jabbed her elbow into the child's father who was sitting next to her. He hastily got up & she stomped off.

Another parent tells of going to a local tea shop with her family who enjoyed the snack. Her son, who had moderate learning difficulties wasn't excessively noisy but his behaviour at 10 was more like that of a happy three year-old & aroused stares from the waitress. The next week the family visited again with the waitress, on their entry, suggesting they might be more comfortable in the (empty) back room. My friend demurred & the waitress repeated the suggestion. The family ignored her & sat down in the main room. They considered making a complaint, but the tea room closed the following week.

Young employees in a public place probably would not behave like that now. For a start, social media might kick in, with footage going viral with the potential to damage the individual and the business. More generally there is a greater awareness of autism probably because more able autistic people like Chris Packham, the TV presenter, talk openly about their autism. But autism is a spectrum & there is less awareness of the particular difficulties autistic people with learning difficulties face. Covid-19 has been particularly stressful for autistic people for whom predictability & routine can be very important. One could have set one's watch by our son's daily timetable. Robert, aged 22 who had moderate to severe autism with learning difficulties, felt safe with his routine of learning & activities. Lockdown meant an end to time with his teachers, no more cinema, no more visits to the Hastings Oxfam shop where he bought 2 videos a week, no more swimming & trampolining. While most of us struggled with the change it was more complicated for autistic people with learning difficulties like Robert who cannot understand why their world had turned upside down.

What I do notice however are more little acts of kindness, which suggests greater understanding. The volunteers at the Oxfam shop in Hastings who keep a stash of children's videos for my son in the back room rather than disposing of them. The couple who bought me a parking ticket at Camber Sands when my parking app wouldn't work & Robert was getting agitated.

That's what makes a difference!
